About the School





Newcastle High School for Girls (NHSG) is an independent, academically selective school for over 660 girls aged 3-18. The School comprises Early Years, Juniors, Seniors and Sixth Form who work as one to create Newcastle High School for Girls' distinct family-feel culture. In September 2014, Church High School and Central Newcastle High School merged to become Newcastle High School for Girls GDST. Founded in 1872, and 1876 respectively, both were established to offer girls an exceptional education and to ensure girls and young women could have an equal place in the world. Their success is noted in the education of thousands of girls from the North-East of England who passed through their doors and whose trailblazing spirit is today at the forefront of Newcastle High School for Girls' vision and mission.

When Newcastle High School for Girls was formed in 2014, there was a determination to reflect the School's roots, which are so firmly planted in the city and surrounding area. The School's iconic seahorse logo reflects the Newcastle city crest symbolises the School's strong links with Newcastle and the surrounding area.

Academic rigour and exceptional teaching and learning are at the heart of an NHSG education. The school offers an exciting curriculum delivered by inspirational teachers who are experts in the ways that girls learn best. This doesn't stop at the classroom door. A vibrant and extensive co-curricular programme ensures that each girl has the opportunity to learn new skills, broaden her horizons and have fun along the way. Senior School

Situated on Tankerville Terrace in Jesmond, surrounded by mature trees and plenty of outdoor space, the school campus fuses the traditional with the contemporary to create a first class learning environment.

In Key Stage 3, pupils follow a broad curriculum that extends academic skills and knowledge. In addition to separate Sciences, English, Maths, Computing and Humanities subjects, girls' study two foreign languages, Classics/Latin, PE, Dance, Drama, Art and Music. All pupils follow an extensive Personal, Social and Health Education programme which will support pupils in the challenges of modern day living and understanding of the wider world. In addition, there are existing plans to extend the Design and Technology curriculum in 2024. In Key Stage 4, at GCSE, pupils continue to study a breadth of subjects and are supported in selecting the best possible pathway for. As well as the core subjects, girls can choose from a range of humanities, languages, computing, PE, Food Technology, Art, Drama, Dance and Music. From September 2024 they will also have the option of Business Studies at GCSE.

Sixth Form

Intellectual development and a love of learning are at the heart of the offer at Sixth Form which provides the ideal bridge between the final years at school and the world beyond. The superb facilities and resources are outstanding, and in Sixth Form, there is plenty of space for independent and private study.

Every pupil is encouraged to follow their own pathway and passions. Pupils typically select three subjects at A Level, with some taking four, and then as part of the wider academic enrichment programme including the recently introduced Life 360 programme which prepares girls for life beyond school. They also embark upon the highly prized Extended Project Qualification (EPQ) or a Gold Arts Award.

Activities beyond the classroom extend academic studies even further through high quality trips, workshops and talks from inspiring speakers. Leadership, enrichment and co-curricular programmes are designed to broaden horizons and develop new skills that will enhance the pupils' Sixth Form experience and NHSG's substantial links with local and regional universities and businesses serve to expand the range of opportunities even further.

Beyond the Curriculum

The co-curricular programme across the Junior and Senior Schools offers a vast range of clubs and activities and fulfils NHSG's aim of allowing girls to explore the world around them. Whether it be sport or music, coding, or chess, through House activities or planning a charity campaign, girls' days are filled with purposeful endeavours.

The facilities support an exciting co-curricular programme. The Junior School occupies five acres of grounds with astro turf surfaces, and the Senior School has a full-sized all-weather England Hockey approved pitch on-site, in addition to two sports halls, a fitness suite, miniastro and hard courts. The Brandling site at Senior School also provides excellent facilities for the performing arts and sports, including a performance studio, recital room, recording studio, practice rooms and 'The Space' which is used for drama lessons and rehearsals.

Overview – The role of Head of Department, Food and Nutrition



The department follows the AQA GCSE specification. Food Preparation and Nutrition is a popular GCSE option, with two Year 10 groups and 1 Year 11 Group from September 2023.

The Food and Nutrition Department is currently in the process on embedding a digitalised curriculum, following the school policy of using Microsoft Teams and One Note.

The department is involved in the co-curricular and super-curricular activities in the school. Our successful recruitment into GCSE is supported by a Year 9 Cookery club which is a popular option.

Our Food and Nutrition Department consists of a state-of-the-art specialist classroom for larger practical sessions. The classroom is equipped with everything that the pupils need to reach their potential in this subject.
